Membership

Membership is open to anyone engaged in applied behavioral research, education, consultation, therapy, or supervision of the delivery of behavioral services in Florida. There are 3 categories of membership:

<u>Professional.</u> Anyone employed full-time who provides or supervises he delivery of behavioral services or is engaged in applied research, or who is part of a team of therapists who provide behavioral training (e.g., physicians, nurses, PTs, OTs, speech pathologists, etc.). We encourage professionals from all areas to join FABA. With this category, there are Ph.D.-level membership and BA/MA-level membership.

Students/Direct Care. Anyone who is currently enrolled in a course of study in an accredited college or university, and has proof of enrollment (current picture ID), and is interested in the application of behavioral principles is eligible for student membership. Also, those direct care staff who are non-supervisory may also qualify for this lower rate. The special lower rate of student/direct care membership is intended to encourage membership from these two populations. Full-time employed students who take courses part-time should apply for Professional membership.

<u>Sustaining.</u> Professional members who are able to provide a substantial amount of financial support to FABA make up this group. Their support is greatly appreciated.

Membership Year:

For dues purposes, the membership year goes from Sept. 1 to Aug. 31. For practical purposes this means that members will pay their annual dues when they register for the Annual Meeting. Thus, all those attending this year's meeting will need to plan on the extra expense of paying their dues. An exception is made for those joining at the mid-year conference (usually in the spring of the year). These members will be considered "paid up members" at the Annual Meeting. Fees are weighted to encourage students and professionals to become members of FABA.

Gaining Acceptance and Achieving Independence: Improving Quality of Life Options for Personal Empowerment Through Skills Building.
